# Founders' Message & Executive Summary

*"Heal the sick, and tell them, 'The Kingdom of God is near you now.'" Luke 10:9*

Fourteen years ago, New Sight began with just a chair under a tree in the Congolese rainforest. We had no clinic, no operating theatre, and no certainty about what the future would hold — only a conviction that no one should lose their sight because they lacked access to care, and a promise from God that He would be with us. There were moments where it felt completely impossible as we faced obstacle after obstacle, but time and again, God provided by opening doors and meeting our needs in extraordinary ways.

Today, that vision has grown into a purpose-built hospital serving patients from across the Republic of Congo and neighbouring countries. As we reflect on the past year, we are humbled by how far this journey has come and deeply grateful to every supporter, volunteer, partner, and member of staff who has made it possible.

**The year ending 31 March 2026 marks the most significant milestone in New Sight's history to date.**

Following the opening of our new hospital in Ouesso, we have entered a new phase of growth, evolving from a specialist eye care charity into an integrated healthcare organisation where restoring sight remains central, but whole-person care is our broader mission.

This year, because of your generosity, we:

- Successfully opened and transitioned services into the **New Sight Hospital**, creating a regional centre for healthcare, training, and community development.
- Continued our 20% annual growth and delivered **more than 4,800 patient consultations and sight-restoring surgeries**, bringing total consultations since 2019 to over **20,000** while maintaining exceptional patient satisfaction—every surveyed patient said they would recommend our services.
- Expanded healthcare services to include dental care, chronic disease clinics, child health programmes, and school screening initiatives, responding to the realities faced by underserved rural communities.
- Strengthened healthcare capacity by training **community health workers, interns, local staff**, as well as **medical professionals** in partnership with **the Ministry of Health**, helping build a sustainable workforce for the future.





- Expanded education and outreach through partnerships with **more than 40 schools**, children's publications reaching approximately **23,000 students per issue**, and innovative youth programmes including our first summer camps.
- Introduced training programmes in **farming** and **maintenance**.
- Established new **research and academic collaborations with international institutions**, positioning New Sight as a centre for evidence-based healthcare and innovation in Central Africa.
- Secured approximately **HKD7 million** in funding while strengthening governance, infrastructure, operational systems, and long-term sustainability. We are raising funds for **Phase 2 of our construction project**, which will provide housing for expatriates who train local staff to ensure the project's long-term impact.

We celebrated so many firsts this year—our first hospital opening, first summer camps, first farming and maintenance training, first extended medical services, and first academic collaborations—each marking new ground as we broaden into whole-person care. Perhaps the greatest lesson of the year has come from our patients themselves. As we restored sight, we encountered countless people suffering from untreated hypertension, diabetes, dental disease, and childhood illnesses with nowhere else to turn. Their needs have shaped our future. The opening of the hospital is therefore not simply the completion of a building—it marks the beginning of a broader vision to provide integrated healthcare that improves health, reduces poverty, strengthens communities, and creates opportunities through education and local capacity building.

As we approach our fifteenth anniversary, our priority is to invest in people: training Congolese professionals, strengthening partnerships, expanding essential services, promoting education, and creating systems that will serve communities for generations to come. What began with consultations under a tree has become a platform for transforming lives through healthcare, education, and community development. While much has changed, our mission remains the same: to serve with compassion and excellence, bringing hope to some of the world's most underserved communities. We invite you to celebrate with us what has been achieved this year and to join us as we continue building a healthier future for northern Congo.

# Overview

*New Sight serves the Republic of Congo to restore and protect sight and deliver integrated whole-person healthcare, life transformation, and community renewal.*

New Sight is a charity registered in Hong Kong (H.K.) and the United Kingdom (U.K.) serving the Republic of Congo (hereafter 'Congo') through healthcare, education, training and community development. In 2012, New Sight pioneered accessible eye care to restore and protect sight in rural Congo. What began as a simple eye clinic in the rainforest—with just a desk and a few chairs—has grown into a platform for integrated whole-person healthcare, bringing healing, hope, life transformation, and community renewal.

## Who We Are

New Sight was founded in the U.K. in 2011 and in Hong Kong in 2013. We restore and protect sight and are expanding to deliver integrated healthcare services in Congo. The charity is governed by trustees in the U.K. and directors in H.K. and operates as a non-profit limited company.

# Objectives

The objectives of the Charity are:

- The advancement of health, and the saving of lives, in particular (but without limitation) by providing assistance overseas, principally (but not exclusively) in the Republic of Congo, for those affected by sight difficulties and other medical conditions; and
- To fulfil such other purposes which are exclusively charitable and are connected to the charitable work of the Charity as the Trustees and Directors may from time to time think fit.

The Trustees and Directors have reviewed the Charity's objectives and activities to ensure they continue to reflect the organisation's vision and future direction, while taking into consideration the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

## Impfondo Eye Centre

Before April 2012, the northern region of Congo had no eye care centre. Joyce and Henri Samoutou relocated from the U.K. to establish the area's first and only non-profit eye centre in Impfondo, the capital of the Likouala Department.

The centre provided eye care services and education to the local community and wider region. Over the years, New Sight developed strong relationships with the government, the Ministry of Health, local authorities, and treated patients from organisations including United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), and Médecins d'Afrique.

In August 2023, New Sight concluded services in Impfondo and redirected its focus to Ouesso, where it operated the Interim Eye Centre and Interim Surgical Centre until the new hospital opened in 2025.





## New Sight Hospital, Ouessou

Following the success of the Impfondo Eye Centre, New Sight was invited by local authorities to build a new hospital in Ouessou, a strategic location allowing accessibility for patients across the Republic of Congo and neighbouring countries including Cameroon, Gabon, and the Central African Republic.

In November 2016, New Sight acquired a six-hectare plot of land in Ouessou, including one hectare donated by the town mayor's office. Construction of phase one of the New Sight Hospital was completed under budget and the hospital officially opened in July 2025.

# From Eye Care to Integrated Healthcare

New Sight is evolving from an eye-focused charity into an integrated healthcare organisation where eye care remains a core entry point, but whole-person care is the broader goal. This transition into a general hospital and community health hub is a response to the realities faced by rural communities in northern Congo. While restoring sight remains central to our mission, we increasingly encounter patients with serious untreated illnesses and no access to further care.

The healthcare workforce crisis in Congo is particularly severe in rural regions. The country has only 12.5 physicians, nurses, and midwives per 10,000 people — approximately one quarter of the workforce density required for effective Universal Health Coverage (UHC) (World Bank, 2022). Most healthcare workers are concentrated in urban areas in the south, leaving northern communities with limited access to timely care, increased travel costs, delayed treatment, and higher rates of preventable illness and mortality.

Expanding into a broader healthcare and community model allows us to respond more effectively, sustainably, and comprehensively to these challenges.

# Highlights & Impact 2025-2026

The year ending 31 March 2026 marked another major milestone in New Sight's journey, defined by continued expansion, strengthened services, and the successful transition into the new hospital in Ouesso.

## Expanding Clinical Services

- Delivered **4,820 consultations** and **sight-restoring surgeries** (>20% year-on-year growth), bringing the cumulative total to **over 20,000** since 2019, while maintaining **100% positive feedback streak**
- Provided **385 pairs of glasses**
- Expanded multidisciplinary care: **dental, child health, and chronic diseases**
- Treated **282 dental patients** during the first campaign
- Conducted **749 school health screenings** over **29 visits** across **13 primary schools**
- Developed partnerships with **4 academic institutions** across **3 continents**

## Community Outreach, Education, and Capacity Building

- Expanded school partnerships from **30 to >40 schools**
- Distributed children's magazines in **17 towns** reaching **~23,000 students per issue**
- **103 school visits**
- Delivered training for **41 community health workers** and **61 medical professionals** sent by the Ministry of Health staff, with **100% positive feedback**
- Trained **26 farming course participants**
- Hosted **three week-long children's summer camps** for **76 participants** with **100% positive feedback from both parents and children**
- Conducted **2 community eye and health screening programmes** in H.K. serving **166 participants**
- Opened a new **library and learning space** for leaders, pastors, trainees, and staff

# A. Infrastructure & Eye Services

*Expanding access to care through our Ouesso Interim Eye Centre, Ouesso Interim Surgical Centre, and the new dedicated comprehensive New Sight Hospital – ensuring the community receives life-changing services.*

## Transition to the New Hospital

Between March and June 2025, significant preparatory work was completed to ensure the safe transition into the new hospital facility. This included construction and repair of an access road and bridge to secure reliable access, site preparation and landscaping, commissioning of key infrastructure such as the incinerator, and final interior works including painting and patient facility setup. Working closely with local authorities, New Sight also secured official occupancy approval for the new building.

On 11 July 2025, following years of development, planning, and partnership made possible through the extraordinary kindness and generosity of our supporters, New Sight began operations in its purpose-built hospital in Ouesso through a soft opening. This marked a major milestone in the organisation's journey from a small eye clinic to a fully operational hospital.

Reflecting on our journey, it is remarkable to note that from working at a simple desk and moving six times as we kept outgrowing each space, we have grown into a 2,000-square-metre purpose-built facility on a 60,000-square-metre, equipped with solar power, water infrastructure, and capacity for future expansion.

### The hospital includes:

1. Inpatient Department
2. Outpatient Department
3. Optical Shop and Workshop
4. Pharmacy
5. Surgical Unit
6. Laser Therapeutic Unit
7. Dental Clinic
8. Community Development Centre and Library
9. Lecture Hall and Classrooms
10. Core infrastructure including off-grid electricity, water supply, and incinerator for clinical waste management

Future expansion plans may include staff accommodation, training facilities, and a nursing school.



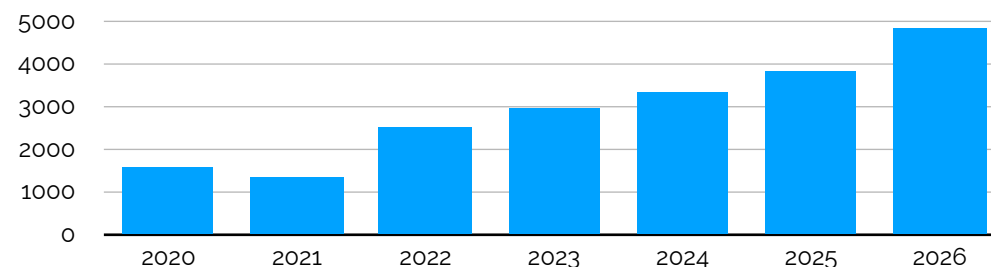


## Patient Consultations

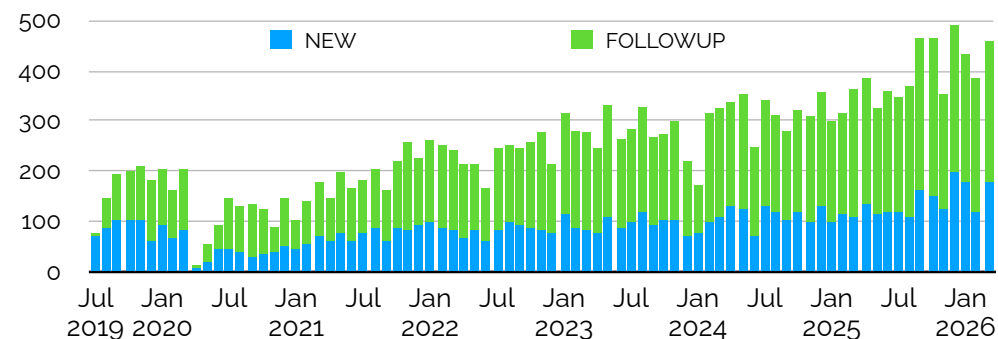
Despite ongoing staff shortages, we have maintained good quality of care while managing an increased number of patient consultations over the year. This achievement reflects both the positive reputation that New Sight has built within the community and the continued dedication of our team. Following our move to the new hospital building, we are actively recruiting additional staff and volunteers to enable us to serve even more patients.

New Sight has continued to experience growth, with 4,820 patient consultations in the year ending 31 March 2026—a 25% increase from the previous year's total of 3,841 consultations. Patient numbers showed a consistent upward trend over the course of the year, with a notable surge following the opening of the new hospital. In the second half of the year, consultation volumes rose by 21% compared to the first half of the year. On average, the team treated 402 patients per month for conditions including eye infections, vision loss, and emergencies. As of the end of March 2026, New Sight has provided a total of 20,408 consultations since July 2019.

Patient consultations since July 2019

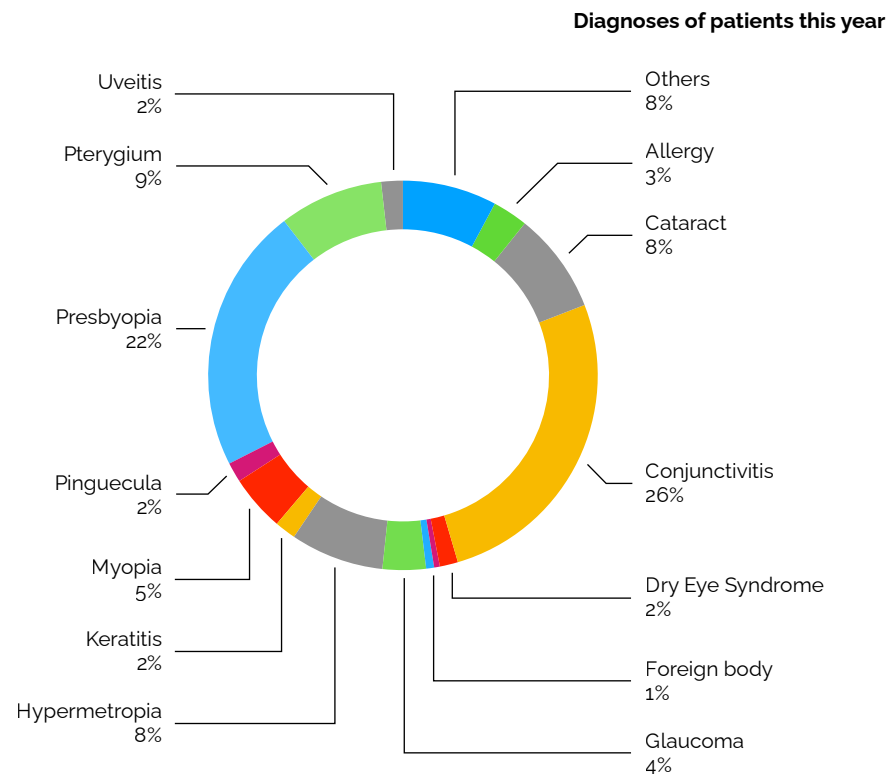




While the majority of our patients come from Ouessou or other parts of the La Sangha region (64%), an increasing number (25%) travel from other parts of the country, and neighbouring countries such as Cameroon and Gabon.

Our services are delivered on a subsidised cost-recovery basis. Patients who cannot afford treatment may receive full financial support through the charity's poverty fund.

The most common diagnoses this year were Conjunctivitis and Presbyopia, which comprised nearly half of our cases.



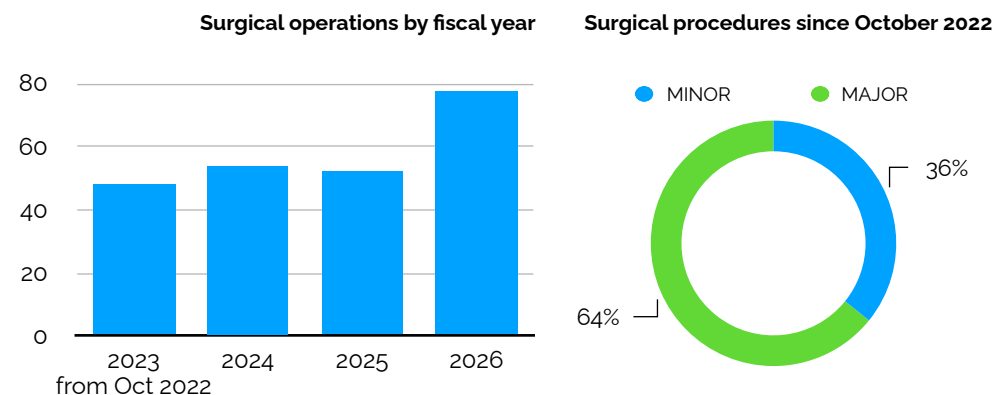
Medicines and clinical supplies are sourced from all over the world, including the U.K., India, and the Netherlands, in adherence to procurement standards set forth by the WHO (World Health Organisation) and IAPB (International Association for the Prevention of Blindness) Valued-Supplier Scheme. With the new app designed and built by a mission team member from Kong Fok Church, Aidan Cheng, we are now able to better monitor our stock level to facilitate procurement. He continues to provide staff training and remote troubleshooting.





## Surgical Procedures

In the year ending 31 March 2026, we successfully carried out 78 vision-restoring operations, representing a 50% rise compared to the previous year. This brings our total number of sight-saving surgeries to 232 since our launch in October 2022. With our new hospital now fully equipped for surgical procedures, we plan to treat more patients each month as our staffing levels grow. We are proud of our excellent surgical outcomes. New Sight continues to provide a vital lifeline for those in need of ophthalmic surgical care.

## Optical Shop

In the year ending 31 March 2026, we supplied patients with 342 pairs of glasses, up from 266 in the previous year. Since the shop first opened in 2019, we have now distributed 1,273 life-changing pairs. Our interns continue to refine their lens-edging skills, helping to ensure that this essential service stays both accessible and affordable for the local community.



## Patient Feedback

All of our patients reported being either satisfied or very satisfied with the service we provided. Over the last year, 589 patients completed the feedback questionnaire. Every single patient expressed satisfaction with the care they received—with between 99% and 100% giving New Sight the highest possible satisfaction score. Furthermore, all respondents said they would return to New Sight and would recommend us to others.

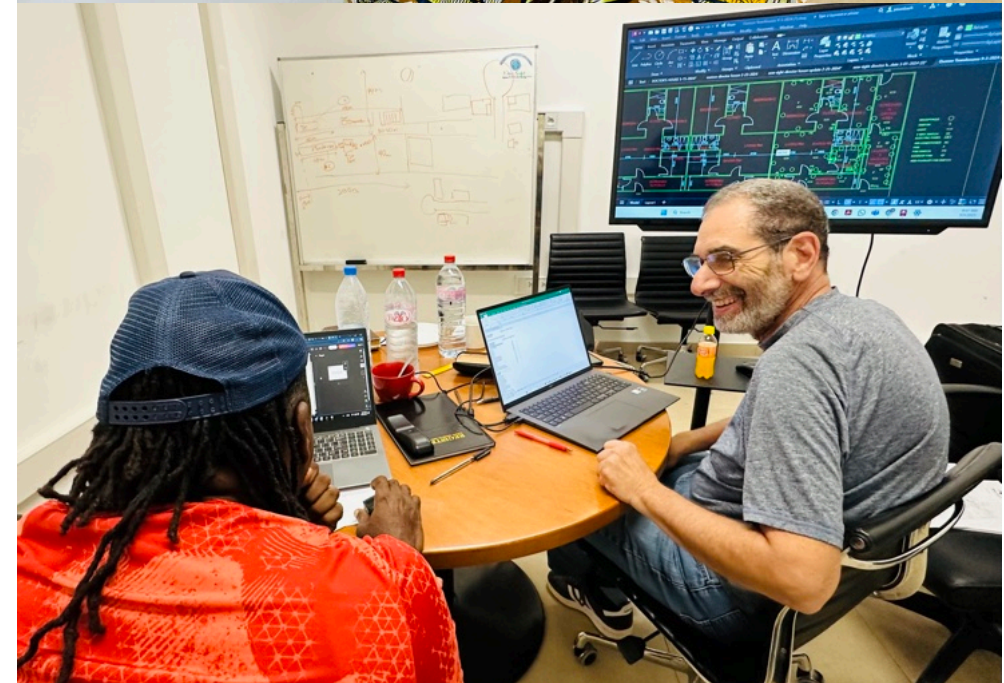

## Hospital Maintenance

Maintaining critical infrastructure is essential to the safe and reliable operation of the hospital. This includes ongoing upkeep of air-conditioning systems, fans, plumbing, generators, solar power infrastructure, and the clinical waste incinerator. Alongside equipment maintenance, New Sight continues to prioritise local capacity-building, with staff receiving practical training in routine maintenance and troubleshooting.

During the year, visiting technical volunteers worked alongside the local team to strengthen infrastructure systems, improve equipment and fuel-monitoring processes, support maintenance planning, and provide hands-on training in areas such as air-conditioning servicing and general building maintenance. Their visits also helped identify future infrastructure priorities and potential technical partnerships.

To support long-term operational resilience, New Sight also acquired a backhoe loader to assist with road and site maintenance, helping ensure safer and more reliable access to the hospital throughout the year.



# B. New Medical Services: Dental, Child Health, Chronic illness

*Empowering communities through education, screening, prevention and early intervention programmes.*

## **First Dental Outreach & Establishment of Dental Services (Jun 2025)**

In June 2025, New Sight reached a major milestone by opening its dental facilities and launching its first dental outreach programme. A dedicated short-term mission team from Friends of Grace, an NGO in the United States, worked very long hours setting up a dental clinic and treating nearly 300 patients in just a few weeks.

Many patients had never previously received dental care and often presented with advanced infections, severe pain, or broken teeth. Despite widespread anxiety surrounding dental treatment, 99% of patient surveys were overwhelmingly positive, with 100% stating that they would return for future treatment. After their departure, patients continue to request dental care, as the nearest qualified dentists are 12 hours away in the capital, highlighting the substantial unmet need for dental care in northern Congo and reinforcing the importance of integrating oral health into broader community healthcare services.

## **Soft Opening of Chronic Diseases Clinic (Jan 2026)**

At the end of December 2025, Dr Osée and Adele Nkengurutse arrived in Ouesso with their two young children to join the New Sight team. We are delighted to welcome them, as they bring much-needed expertise to Congo. Before moving to Congo, Dr Osée, a family medicine physician, previously served as President of the Burundi Christian Medical and Dental Association (CMDA) and as the regional representative for Eastern Francophone Africa for International CMDA. Adele, whose background includes IT training for women, is now supporting hospital administration. Since the launch of the Chronic Diseases Clinic in January 2026, Dr Osée has already seen close to 100 patients, identified high blood pressure in 64 of the 119 teachers screened at a local school, provided follow-up care, and is leading the expansion of this much-needed service.







## Launch of Child Health Programme & School Screening Campaigns (Nov 2025 - Present)

In the first epidemiological study of childhood eye disease in Congo since the 1980s, New Sight — supported by the Directors of Education and Health — conducted a large-scale school health screening of 630 final-year primary school students and 119 teachers in Ouessou. By the end of March 2026, all ten public schools had been screened, and Phase 2 had begun, with three private schools already completed.

The screenings included vision testing, eye examinations, dental checks, height and weight measurements, Body-Mass-Index calculation, and general medical assessments. The results revealed a substantial burden of previously unrecognised health needs among both students and teachers.

Findings among students:

- 43% had vision or eye-related problems requiring further investigation and were offered free consultations and care at the hospital
- 25% had one or more dental caries
- Nearly half required medical follow-up for issues such as headaches, respiratory symptoms, gastrointestinal complaints, and musculoskeletal concerns

Findings among teachers:

- The average BMI was 30.6, indicating a substantial burden of overweight and obesity
- 54% had elevated blood pressure requiring follow-up, with several cases at dangerously high levels needing urgent care

### International Research Collaboration *Evidence to Guide Future Services*

Following completion of Phase 2 of the school screening programme, data analysis will be conducted in collaboration with academic partners from:

- University of Edinburgh Medical School
- London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine
- University of British Columbia

The findings will help guide future regional healthcare planning and strengthen evidence-based community health interventions in northern Congo.

All students received New Sight magazines and certificates to promote healthy living.

New Sight's goal was to better understand the health needs of schoolchildren, raise awareness, and gather community-driven insights. The findings highlight an urgent need for public education on healthy lifestyles — balanced diets, regular exercise, and routine dental and eye care — to ensure more children and adults receive the care they need.



# C. Education & Youth Development

*Supporting the next generation through literacy, health education, creativity, and community-based programmes.*

## Children's Magazine and School Partnerships

New Sight's pioneering children's magazine — the only publication of its kind in Congo — continued to expand its reach throughout 2025/26.

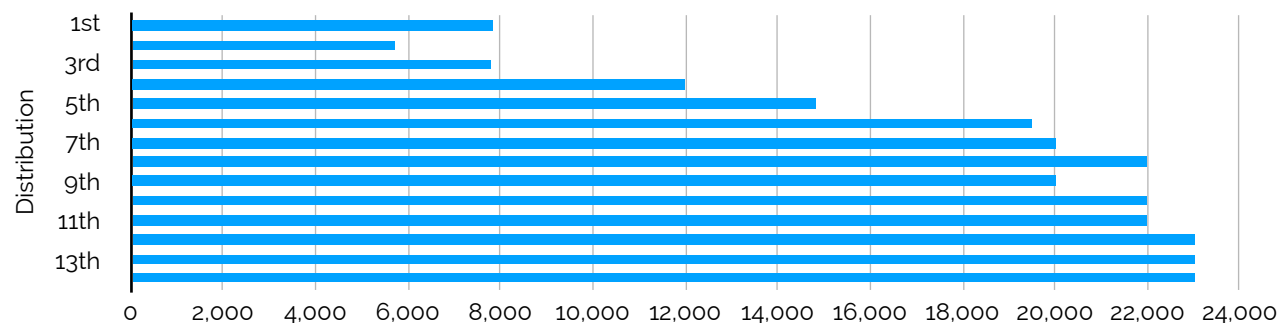
Originally created by the Samoutou children during the COVID-19 lockdown to provide educational activities for children without access to school or learning materials, the magazine has since evolved into a broader platform for literacy, health education, creativity, and community engagement.

By March 2026, more than 242,000 copies had been distributed across schools, churches, and communities in Ouessou and sixteen other locations across the country. Requests from schools and community leaders continue to grow with each new edition, reflecting both the shortage of children's educational materials and the enthusiasm with which the magazine has been received.

Alongside distribution, New Sight teams visit partner schools throughout the year to run interactive educational activities designed to encourage reading, learning, creativity, and healthy living. The children's energy and engagement continue to be a tremendous encouragement to the team.

New Sight also continued collaborating through its Project Two Front Teeth with students from the Canadian International School of Hong Kong, whose contributions to French-language content supported literacy, global citizenship, and cross-cultural exchange.

## First-ever children's summer camp (Jul 2025)

In July 2025, New Sight launched the first children's summer camp known in Ouessou — and one of the first of its kind in the country.

Made possible through the opening of the new hospital facility, the availability of a minibus, and the support of teenage volunteers, the pilot programme ran over three weeks and welcomed 76 children from schools and churches across Ouessou.

Each week-long day camp combined educational activities, games, teamwork, health education, problem-solving exercises, creative learning, and physical activity in a safe and encouraging environment. The programme concluded each week with presentations, performances, and celebrations involving parents, families, and headteachers.

Feedback from both children and parents was overwhelmingly positive, with 100% of respondents stating that they enjoyed the programme and would recommend it to others. Beyond recreation, the camps helped foster confidence, friendships, teamwork, and opportunities for personal growth among participating children.

Here are some parents' feedback:

*"This Camp has added layers of knowledge and life skills."*

*"It allowed my child to thrive, learn new things, and gain confidence."*

# D. Training & Capacity Building

*Equipping local health professionals, trainees, and staff with the skills needed to build sustainable and self-sufficient healthcare systems.*

## **First Aid and Basic Life Support Training (Sep 2025)**

In September 2025, New Sight hosted a three-day First Aid and Basic Life Support training course for local doctors and nurses selected by the Director of Health. Delivered by a six-member short-term mission team from Kong Fok Church, Hong Kong, the programme included emergency response skills, CPR, and the use of automated external defibrillators (AEDs).

Fifteen healthcare professionals completed the course. Feedback was exceptionally positive, with 100% of participants stating that they would recommend the training and wished to participate in future courses organised by New Sight. **The Director overseeing all the hospitals in Congo was so impressed by the programme that he requested New Sight explore opportunities to expand similar training nationally.**

## **Hypertension and Diabetes Training (Nov 2025)**

On 29 November 2025, in collaboration with the Director of Health and with support from present and retired visiting professors from Stanford Medical School and the University of California, San Francisco, U.S.A., New Sight delivered a regional training workshop focused on hypertension and diabetes management.

Forty-six healthcare workers attended, many travelling long distances to participate. The workshop strengthened knowledge and practical skills related to two rapidly increasing chronic diseases in Congo while also fostering collaboration among healthcare professionals across the region. Participant evaluations were highly encouraging, with all attendees rating the training positively.







## Community Health Worker Training (Feb-Mar 2026)

In February and March 2026, New Sight conducted week-long community health training courses at the hospital for 41 participants across four cohorts, including one participant who travelled more than 15 hours to reach Ouessou. The programme combined lectures, practical demonstrations, group discussions, and participant presentations covering topics such as health promotion, chronic disease, hygiene, ethics, and common misconceptions surrounding healthcare.

The training aimed not only to strengthen community health knowledge and develop local health advocates, but also to identify individuals with potential for future internships and employment within New Sight. Several participants demonstrated strong aptitude and commitment and are now being considered for further development opportunities.

## New Sight Training School (on-going)

Training local staff remains central to New Sight's long-term sustainability vision. Medical interns continued to advance their skills in both operating theatres and consultation settings, while also learning to use newly introduced retinal imaging and diagnostic equipment.

Our continuing professional development programme was further strengthened through updated KPIs (Key Performance Indicators), review procedures, and regular competency assessments designed to support high clinical standards and long-term workforce development.

In May 2025, New Sight also launched a six-month non-medical internship programme aimed at strengthening hospital operations and support services. Interns rotated through multiple departments during a structured placement period, allowing the organisation to identify promising long-term staff while providing valuable workplace experience for local young adults.

## Team Development and International Support

Throughout the year, New Sight benefited from the contribution of local and international volunteers, visiting clinicians, engineers, educators, and advisors who supported clinical services, infrastructure development, training, administration, and community outreach.

We remain deeply grateful to all those who served alongside New Sight during the year. The visiting professionals, volunteers, and supporting teams were greatly instrumental to community outreach and services.



# E. Community Development & Social Impact

*Supporting healthier, stronger, and more resilient communities through practical, educational, and humanitarian initiatives.*

## **Farming God's Way Training (Mar 2026)**

In March 2026, New Sight hosted a Farming God's Way (FGW) training programme led by Tom Brane and Rev. John Combest. FGW is a biblically based sustainable agriculture initiative that equips under-resourced farmers with low-cost techniques designed to improve crop yields, soil health, and long-term food security.

Hands-on training was conducted at the New Sight hospital site, where a demonstration garden was successfully established. Approximately twenty participants attended each day of the programme, learning practical methods including mulching, no-tillage farming, and soil conservation techniques.

The initiative reflects New Sight's broader commitment to supporting community wellbeing beyond healthcare alone, recognising the close relationship between nutrition, poverty reduction, and long-term health outcomes.

## **Opening of Community Library and Learning Space (Sep 2025)**

In September 2025, New Sight formally dedicated its new hospital library and learning space, created to support ongoing education for staff, trainees, pastors, and community leaders.

The library reflects New Sight's wider vision of the hospital not only as a place of treatment, but also as a centre for learning, leadership development, and community empowerment. Particular emphasis has been placed on providing resources for pastors and local leaders, recognising the important role they play in shaping community attitudes towards health, wellbeing, and trust in medical services.







## Supporting Vulnerable Groups at Christmas

New Sight's commitment to the community extends beyond clinical services. Continuing a long-standing Christmas tradition, the Samoutou family and local team visited the prison, orphanage, and home for elderly and vulnerable individuals cared for by local nuns, distributing gifts, food, and essential supplies.

These visits provided an opportunity to support individuals who are often overlooked within the community and reflected New Sight's ongoing commitment to dignity, compassion, and human connection.

## Free Community Eye and Health Screening in Hong Kong (May 2025 & Mar 2026)

New Sight conducted free community eye and health screening programmes in Hong Kong in partnership with Union Church in May 2025 and The Hong Kong Society for the Aged (SAGE) in March 2026 to serve underserved groups including domestic helpers, asylum seekers, and elderly residents.

The AI fundus screening component was generously sponsored by Roche (including OCT) in May 2025 and Bayer in March 2026, enabling earlier detection of diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, and age-related macular degeneration.

Across both programmes, screenings of 166 participants revealed significant levels of previously undiagnosed hypertension (24%; 52%), elevated blood glucose (2%; 22%), cataracts (unknown; 23%), retinal disease, refractive errors, and other chronic health concerns requiring medical follow-up. Several participants were found to have dangerously elevated blood pressure readings despite having no prior diagnosis.

The initiatives combined preventive healthcare with community engagement and youth volunteer development through New Sight's 'Project Two Front Teeth' programme.



# F. Partnerships, Advocacy & Stakeholder Relations

*Strengthening collaboration with governments, international organisations, academic institutions, professional bodies, and visiting professionals to improve healthcare systems and expand access to care.*

## Engagement with Local Authorities

New Sight operates under a formal agreement with Congo under its Ministry of Health, granting official recognition as a healthcare institution.

This agreement enables streamlined visa processing, work permits, and tax exemptions, and provides a strong foundation for continued collaboration with national and regional health authorities.

## District Health Meeting (Apr 2025)

In April 2025, New Sight Hospital hosted the District Health Meeting for all doctors and health institution directors in the Ouesso region. The meeting was led by Dr Jeodel Louya, Chief Medical Officer for the Ouesso Health District.

This marked an important milestone in positioning New Sight as a regional hub for collaboration, learning, and shared problem-solving among healthcare providers. The meeting enabled clinicians and health leaders to exchange updates, strengthen coordination, and address operational challenges across the district.







## High-Level Government Visit (Mar 2026)

In March 2026, we were honoured to welcome Minister of Health Dr Jean-Rosaire Ibara, Prefet Edouard Denis Okouya, President of the Departmental Council Emmanuel Akouelakoum, Mayor of Ouessou Armel Sidobe Gah, Mayor of Commune 1 Irène Andziou, Mayor of Commune 2 Hamed Camara Dekamo, and Departmental Director of Health Dr Félicité Dolama, together with their delegations, for a tour of our hospital. They expressed appreciation for the facilities and equipment and were enthusiastic about our clinical services, training initiatives, and community programmes. We were encouraged by the constructive discussions on strengthening collaboration and improving regional access to healthcare.

## Conferences & Speaking Engagements

Throughout the year, New Sight continued to strengthen relationships with international academic, church, and medical partners through structured visits, conferences, and field engagement.

In May 2025, Joyce met with long-standing supporters in Hong Kong, providing opportunities to share progress updates and deepen relationships with key stakeholders.

In September 2025, Joyce was invited to speak at the inaugural Congolese conference of the International Christian Medical and Dental Association (ICMDA) in Brazzaville, bringing together healthcare professionals from across the Central African region and strengthening collaboration within the Christian medical community.

Between October and November 2025, Joyce and Henri visited Canada and the United States. They met with Rotary and Lions Clubs, academic institutions including the University of Montreal, Collège d'Alma, and Cégep Garneau, and global mission partners such as the Christian & Missionary Alliance, Terre Sans Frontières, Iris Mondial, and Collaboration Santé Internationale. They also spoke at the Global Missions Health Conference (GMHC) in Louisville, Kentucky. These engagements focused on partnership development, recruitment, and long-term collaboration.

During this period, clinical continuity in Ouessou was supported by visiting ophthalmologist Dr Joseph Monday, ensuring uninterrupted patient care.

## Legal, Governance & Professional Support

New Sight continues to benefit from pro bono legal and governance support from leading international law firms, including A&O Shearman and Akin Gump Strauss Hauer & Feld in Hong Kong. This ongoing support strengthens organisational governance, regulatory compliance, and long-term institutional resilience.





## Rotary International Collaboration (District 7790)

Following presentations to Rotary Clubs in North America, Rotary District 7790, comprising 60 clubs in Maine and Quebec, has expressed strong support for a planned international vocational training collaboration with New Sight.

The programme, scheduled for 2027–2028, will bring multidisciplinary training teams to Ouessou to support capacity building in nursing, optometry, optical technology, dentistry, accounting, and hospital management. This initiative reflects a shared commitment to strengthening long-term clinical skills and sustainable healthcare delivery within the hospital.

## Academic Partnerships

New Sight is developing clinical and research collaborations with leading academic institutions, including the University of Edinburgh Medical School, the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, the University of British Columbia, and the University of Hong Kong Medical School.

These partnerships will support evidence-based medicine for northern Congo and similar resource-limited settings.

## Visiting Volunteers

New Sight was privileged to have hosted 27 visiting volunteers this year, each bringing valuable skills that strengthened our work. Their contributions spanned medical care, administration, IT, teaching, clinical governance, construction, maintenance, and children's programmes. We are deeply grateful for the expertise, energy, and encouragement they brought to our team and community.

# G. Fundraising, Events & Communications

*Mobilising resources, raising awareness, and engaging global supporters through creative fundraising initiatives, events, and community-driven campaigns.*

## Eyes on the Stars Charity Concert (Nov 2025)

On 23 November 2025, the SAR Philharmonic Orchestra hosted a charity concert at Hong Kong City Hall in support of New Sight.

Titled *Eyes on the Stars*, the event marked both a celebration of the new hospital opening and a major step in re-establishing structured fundraising activities following several years without a large-scale public event.

The concert featured orchestral performances of opera excerpts including *The Magic Flute*, *Aida*, *Nabucco*, and *Rigoletto*. A total of 1,351 tickets were issued, with strong attendance from both long-standing supporters and new audiences.

The event successfully raised awareness and support for New Sight's expanding work in Congo.

## Seasonal Charity Fairs (Nov–Dec 2025)

New Sight participated in several seasonal fundraising fairs, strengthening community engagement and donor support:

- Kong Fok Church Missions Fair (Nov 2025)
- Union Church Christmas Missions Fair (Nov 2025)
- Diocesan Girls' School Mini Bazaar (Dec 2025)

These events combined fundraising with public education, featuring Congolese crafts, calendars, and awareness materials, while engaging students, families, and church communities in New Sight's mission.

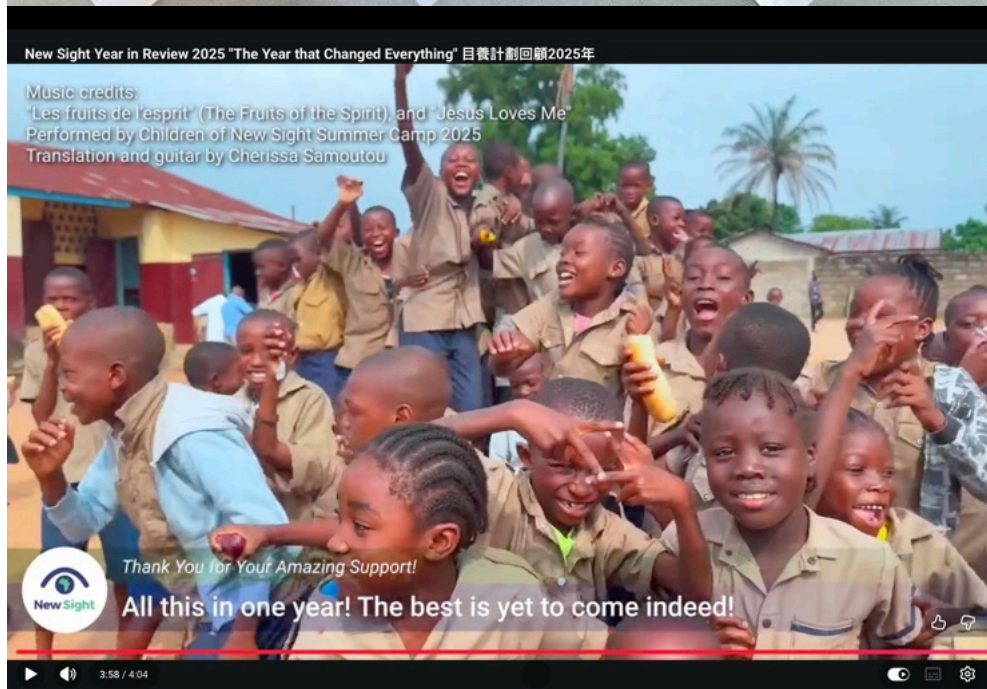

# Patient Stories

## Alex's Journey

On the first day the new hospital opened, New Sight cared for Alex, a one-year-old child with bacterial conjunctivitis.

Following assessment and treatment, Alex recovered well. The experience highlighted the importance of compassionate care alongside medical treatment.

## Lysette's Story

Lysette was a high-performing student whose education was disrupted following severe vision loss after an eye injury.

Following treatment at New Sight, her confidence gradually returned and she was able to participate in New Sight's children's summer camp.

Her story reflects the broader social and educational impact of restored vision.

## Pastor Pierre's Restoration

After losing the sight in his right eye to a cataract, Pastor Pierre faced severe strain trying to read scripture and lead his congregation. He traveled to our hospital, where we successfully performed surgery to restore his vision. Touched by our staff's high professional standards and affordable care, Pierre now hopes to volunteer his own time to comfort and support other patients at the facility.





# Financial Overview

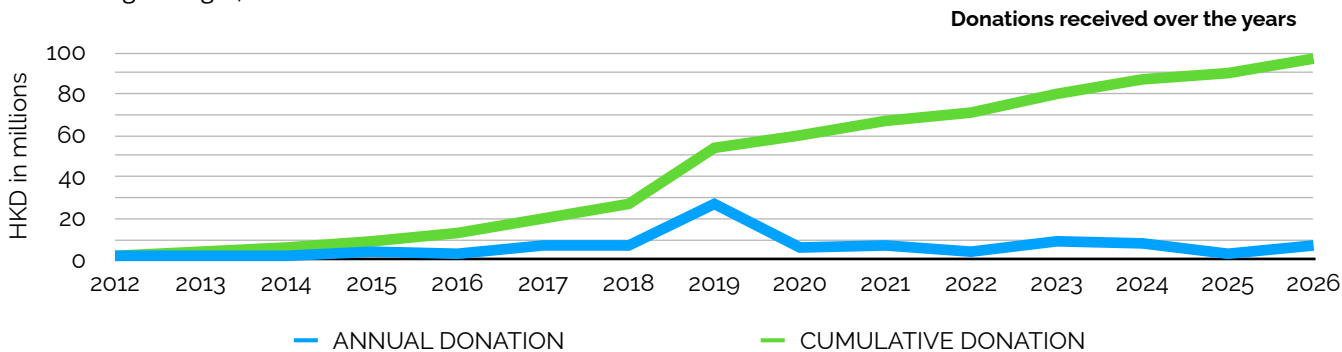
Over the past 14 years, New Sight has been deeply grateful to have received more than HKD97 million (USD 12.4M / GBP 9.2M) in financial support—made possible through the generosity of the donors, partners, and volunteers who share our vision and values. The first phase of New Sight Hospital, which includes outpatient, surgical, and inpatient sections, as well as facilities for training, screening, and community programmes—such as our children’s magazines and school partnerships—has now been completed. The hospital’s soft opening in July 2025 marked an exciting new chapter, as we continue to expand our capacity and prepare to offer additional aid in new domains, including dentistry and other medical specialties.

New Sight has actively sought and greatly benefited from numerous in-kind donations, including medical equipment, furniture, printed materials, waived storage and office rental costs, and pro bono services in engineering, architecture, legal, compliance, finance, human resources, marketing, and event management from professionals around the world. We take every donation seriously and are committed to maximising impact while minimising waste.

In the fiscal year ending March 2026, four-fifths of our expenditure was directed towards programme costs—a reflection of our commitment to responsible stewardship and impact-driven service. Within these programme costs:

- Around two-thirds was dedicated to core programme activities, staff training, and the operation of our clinic to deliver impactful services where otherwise there is none.
- The rest of the program cost was dedicated to supporting systems, logistics, and other vital infrastructure, essential to sustaining an effective long-term presence in the Republic of Congo. These foundational costs rose this year due to the increased volume of container shipments required for the successful opening of new facilities. Meanwhile, our annual patient reach continues to grow by 25%, and our school partnerships have expanded from 30 to over 40—enabling the delivery of critical equipment and care to rural communities.

We remain deeply committed to fiscal accountability, ensuring that every dollar entrusted to us goes towards building stronger, more sustainable futures.







# Looking Ahead: Meeting Tomorrow's Needs Together

As New Sight approaches its 15th anniversary next year, we enter a new chapter shaped by rapid growth and increasing responsibility. With a fully operational hospital now established, our focus is shifting from building foundations to strengthening systems, developing local leadership, and expanding services sustainably.

To continue meeting the growing needs of our patients while maintaining safe, high-quality care, we are seeking support across five interconnected priorities.

## 1. Building a Skilled Local Health Workforce

People remain the cornerstone of long-term sustainability. New Sight is working to strengthen structured training across all areas of the workforce — including medicine, nursing, optometry, community health, administration, finance, human resources, and hospital maintenance.

Developing these pathways will create a coordinated pipeline of skilled Congolese professionals equipped to lead services independently in the years ahead.

## 2. Expanding Services for Unmet Needs

With foundational systems in place, New Sight is preparing to expand into areas of significant unmet need. Priorities include dentistry (following the successful first outreach in 2025), child health programmes (building on school screenings and summer camps), family medicine (developing from chronic disease clinics), and continued development of eye care through improved diagnostic equipment and retinal technology. These developments will enable earlier detection, broader treatment, and more integrated care for children and adults.

## 3. Enabling Training through on-site Accommodation

To accelerate knowledge transfer and strengthen clinical and operational systems, New Sight plans to develop on-site accommodation for visiting trainers, clinicians, and partner organisations. This will allow longer placements, more consistent training, and deeper collaboration — a key enabler of sustainable capacity-building.





#### 4. Strengthening Partnerships and Operational Systems

New Sight continues to deepen collaboration with local health and education systems, international partners, visiting professionals, and mission teams. Alongside these partnerships, practical systems remain essential: donor management tools, logistics and shipping support, medicines and clinical consumables, and professional video editing for training and communication. These operational supports directly enable frontline service delivery and long-term growth.

#### 5. Inspiring and Equipping the Next Generation

New Sight is committed to encouraging those exploring service and global health. Our developing [Missions Resources Page](#) shares stories, reflections, and personal insights from our work in Congo, offering an accessible starting point for individuals, schools, and churches considering mission involvement.

Alongside this, we plan to develop a more structured platform for sharing clinical, training, and professional resources in due course.

We also continue to engage younger generations through Project Two Front Teeth, encouraging creativity, education, and service-led engagement that builds awareness and compassion.

Together, these initiatives reflect our commitment not only to delivering care today, but also to equipping those who will shape the future.

#### A Milestone Year Ahead

The period from 2026 to 2027 marks a pivotal season of consolidation and growth as New Sight prepares to celebrate 15 years of service. What began as a small initiative has grown into a fully functioning hospital and integrated community health system.

The next phase is about deepening impact, strengthening local leadership, and ensuring that every expansion is both sustainable and transformative.

With continued partnership and shared commitment, we look forward to building a healthcare system that not only restores sight and treats disease, but also strengthens communities for generations to come.
